

The Rich Heritage of Indonesian Batik - the story of a Cloth Time Traveller

Batik, or cloth made using wax-resisting dyeing technique, could be said to be as old as the people of the Indonesian archipelago, and is found in important rituals and everyday lives of Indonesians from birth to burial. In October 2009, UNESCO designated Indonesian Batik as a Masterpiece of Oral and Intangible Heritage of Humanity. The talk will be a journey to explore the cultural heritage and artistic tradition of Batik as the fabric has evolved through the ages.

LECTURE/TALK

The Appreciation and Connoisseurship of Chinese Rubbings

Rubbings are inked impressions on paper that have been reproduced from engravings or reliefs. They are one of the key ways to preserve Chinese art, culture, and history since ancient times. Despite their long history, rubbings have not been as popular as Chinese paintings and calligraphy due to the inherent difficulty in appreciating and authenticating them.

This talk attempts to explore the lesser-known art form of rubbings in Imperial China, through selected pieces from the collection of University Museum and Art Gallery, the University of Hong Kong that have never been shown to the public. Among them, many are emblematic of Chinese calligraphic traditions, religions and numismatics and everyday life up until the 20th century. Most notable is the extremely rare rubbing of the Southern Song dynasty stone inscription from Joss House Bay, the earliest dated rock engraving in Hong Kong. In addition, this talk will also introduce the audience to some basic terminologies and knowledge in rubbing connoisseurship.

About the speaker:

Dr. Sarah Ng, Associate curator of the University Museum and Art Gallery of the University of Hong Kong (HKU), is also an honorary assistant professor at the Department of Fine Arts, HKU.





WORKSHOP Batik Demonstration and Workshop

In the workshop, the instructor will demonstrate Batik techniques by using canting pens, wood or copper batik stamps and paintbrushes, and then guide participants to apply wax using these tools and make their own pattern or image with the dyeing process to produce a handkerchief. Two identical sessions of the workshop will be offered.

About the speaker:

Josephine Obin Komara is a well-known textile designer from Indonesia and the founder of the Museum Kain in Bali. She has been honoured as one of Indonesia's living National Treasures for her creative and preservation work with textiles. MUSIC IN ART SPACE Jockey Club Street Music Series

Over 80,000 music lovers, most of whom from underprivileged groups and at-risk young people, enjoyed the concerts copresented by the Hong Kong Arts Centre and the Kung Music Workshop. LECTURE/ TALK To See a World in a Grain of Sand: Ancient Maritime and Overland Trade

"The world in a grain of sand" is an exhibition that uses a small number of objects to tell a lot about the extensive maritime and overland trade routes of the past. In the talk, the curator will talk about the spread of decorative style, religious ideas and the development of technology that came about as a result of centuries of trade and cultural connections between China and the world through interesting objects in the galleries.

About the speaker:

Libby Chan is Senior Curator of the Hong Kong Maritime Museum.



Contemporary ceramic gives artists a lot of possibilities. Works come in the forms of fine ceramics, sculpture, or even cross-disciplinary objects. Contemporary ceramic is no longer just design, techniques, or craftsmanship, but also works that are injected with the ideas, contents, and elements of our era.

About the speaker:

Johnson Tsang combines realist sculptural techniques with surrealist imagination. In 2002, Tsang started to find a way to represent splashes with ceramics. He created the Yuanyang series, which were then collected by the Hong Kong Museum of Art and the Yingge Ceramics Museum of Taiwan. In 2011 and 2012, Tsang's works, "Bowls of Fantasy" and "Splash of Wonder", were the first Chinese artist awarded both the Special Prize of Korea Gyeonggi International Ceramix Biennale 2011 International Competition and Grand Prize of 2012 Taiwan International Ceramics Biennale respectively.

LECTURE/TALK

The Story of the Thornhill Collection and Staffordshire University

The Stem Cup was the most valuable of 270 items bequeathed to the Staffordshire University by a collector named Mr Ernest Thornhill in 1944, having originally been sent there during wartime to safeguard the collection. Upon rediscovering the collection, which has been hidden away in storage for a significant number of years, the University appointed Lyon & Turnbull to auction the Stem Cup in order to raise essential funds to build a permanent new home for the remainder of the collection at its Stoke-on-Trent campus. This resource centre will enable student access to the collection for their study, complying with the original bequest and wishes of Mr Thornhill. The Thornhill Stem cup will be offered at auction in Hong Kong.

About the speakers:

Rosy Crehan, Deputy Vice-Chancellor of the University, and Anna Westin, Consultant Specialist, will share the story behind the collection of Mr Ernest Thornhill, its stem cup and the future that brings from the sale for the remaining 269 pieces to be curated, conserved and enjoyed in a facility that will attract a broader audience to Staffordshire.

Lyon & Turnbull and Freeman's Inaugural Auction in Hong Kong: Chinese Works of Art

Lyon & Turnbull and Freeman's will travel to Hong Kong to hold their inaugural Chinese Works of Art auction. Leading this sale will be the Thornhill Stem Cup — a remarkable blue and white Ming period piece previously in the personal collection of English collector, Ernest Thornhill, which was bequeathed to the University of Staffordshire in 1944. The Thornhill Stem Cup is an excellent example of its type, which is virtually unseen outside museum collections. Today, the National Palace Museum, acknowledged to hold the finest collection in the world, has a collection of over 2,000 various Xuande pieces.

LECTURE/TALK

French Missionaries and Cultural Exchange Between China and France

In 1687, five French mathematicians were on a royal mission to China. Among them, Joachim Bouvet and Jean-François Gerbillon were invited by the Kangxi Emperor to stay in the court. From that same group, Jean de Fontaney, Louis le Comte and Claude de Visdelou were given permission to preach in China. Following this first mission, French Jesuits gradually became a significant missionary force. These individuals also made great contributions to the Sino-French cultural exchange. Through them, gifts were exchanged between Louis XIV and Kangxi. Furthermore, the missionaries introduced numerous French technologies to China. Their letters—such as the widely circulated Lettres édifiantes et curieuses—and publications that include Le Comte's Nouveau mémoire sur l'état présent de la Chine made Qing China known to Europe, leading to significant influence on the waves of French chinoiserie and on the work of Enlightenment thinkers such as Voltaire and Montesquieu.

About the Speaker:

Shenwen Li is Professor in history and Director of the Centre d'études Québec-Chine at Laval University in Quebec, Canada. He specialises in the Jesuit culture, the multifaceted relationships between China and the Occident during the 17th and 18th centuries, and Ming and Qing socio-cultural history.

LECTURE/ TALK Affordable Luxuries in the Golden Age

This talk will focus on the sudden influx of Asian luxury goods into the Netherlands in the 17th century and its implications for Dutch arts, culture, and society. A new market for affordable Asian luxuries supplied by the VOC, the Dutch East India Company, emerged in the Netherlands, and enthralled consumers brought new colours, patterns, and textures to their interiors and wardrobes. These objects also inspired Dutch artists and made their ways into portraits, genre scenes, and particularly still-life paintings. The appreciation for these Asian imports developed and they finally became an integral part of Dutch culture and luxury living.

About the speaker:

Jan van Campen studied Art History in Leiden. He worked at the Bubb Kuyper auction house in Haarlem and the Princesseh of Ceramics Museum in Leeuwarden. In 2000, he earned his Ph.D. studying Chinese objects of The Hague lawyer Jean Theodore Royer (1737-1807). He has worked as Curator of Asian Export Art in the Rijksmuseum since 2001. He is one of the curators of the Asia > Amsterdam exhibition.

"35 years of Collecting" Collectors Circle Panel discussion

The Fourth Edition of Asia Week Hong Kong will conclude with a panel discussion and a cocktail reception that follows. The event highlights the myriad meanings of collecting, and is hosted in support of the Friends of the Art Museum at the Institute of Chinese Studies, The Chinese University of Hong Kong at the beautiful premises of Bonhams.

The Friends of the Art Museum has long promoted the appreciation and study of Chinese art and culture. The panel discussion follows up on last year's relaunch event of the Collectors Circle supported by the Asia Week Hong Kong. After the acquisition of the "Zen Lotus" by painter Lui Shou Kwan (1919 – 1975), the Friends of the Art Museum will make another major gift to celebrate its 35th Anniversary in November.

A presentation on the highlights on the Museum's history and collection by Prof. Josh Yiu, the Museum's Associate Director, will be followed by a panel discussion moderated by Ms. Enid Tsui from the South China Morning Post with Mr. Vincent Lo, Justice Robert Tang, Prof. Josh Yiu, Mr. Howard Bilton, Mr. Romi Lamba and Ms. Betty Lo on the meanings and experiences of collecting art with the theme of "35 years of Collecting". The discussion reflects back on the contributions to the collection made by the Friends of the Art museum over the years, and the profound importance of supporting art museums for art patrons and the community alike.

A Glimpse of Tsui's Collection

In 1991, Dr. T.T. Tsui invited his friend, famous artist Huang Yongyu to visit his first private Museum "The Tsui Museum" in Hong Kong and gifted Huang a copy of the collection catalogue as souvenir. While the artist opened the catalogue, he was captivated by nine lively antique potteries with a sense of humour among the many treasures. They inspired him to create an album for them as a return of the friendship with Dr. Tsui.

Friendship between the two men was sealed. The name of this album "A Glimpse of Tsui's Collection" is a metonymy of the extensive collection of Dr. Tsui, reflecting only a small group of his marvellous amount of treasures.

The exhibition displays the album and seven precious funerary potteries from the Han and Tang dynasties. They reflect the prevailing social custom and life, such as lavish ceremonial burial. Through the album, we can see the interaction between paintings and artefacts, and the sincere friendship between the collector and the artist

The Art of Takashi Wakamiya: Contemporary Japanese Lacquer

The exhibition is held in collaboration with Takashi Wakamiya's studio Hikoju Makie, and with the support of the Japanese Consulate General in Hong Kong and Macau, to display a selection of contemporary objects in Japanese lacquer.

Steeped in history, Japan has a highly developed tradition of creating exquisite objects from lacquer, both for decorative and domestic use. Over the years, Hikoju Makie has grown into a respected workshop that brings together celebrated traditions, innovations, quality and detail-oriented craftsmanship.

Wakamiya excels in the practice and teaching of traditional lacquer techniques with impeccable precision and has developed an interest in executing, in lacquer, objects historically made from unrelated materials, such as bronze or ceramic. His studio creates these imitations with such remarkable exactness that onlookers are fooled by the medium. A master of deception, Wakamiya also specialises in the creation of life-like animals, vegetables, and fruits.

The E Jun Qi Bronze Tallies: The Earliest Permit of Tariff Exemption in China

This exhibition centres on the E Jun Qi bronze tallies collected in the Anhui Museum, which was a permit of tariff exemption bestowed to Qi, the Lord of E by the Chu king Mi'huai. Only five tallies were unearthed in the whole country and we are showing two in this exhibition, among which one is designated for land transport, and the other is for water transport. Both inscribed with seal script characters inlaid with gold, the text on the tallies documents the trade, transport routes and tariff regime of the State of Chu in the Warring States period. Shedding lights on the tally system, commerce, transportation network, history, geography and feudal system of the Chu kingdom, the tallies are very rich in academic value in spite of their small sizes.

To further enhance visitors' understanding of the E Jun Qi tallies, parts of chariots, apparatus for measurement and Chu currencies are also selected to supplement the main exhibits.

Giuseppe Castiglione – Lang Shining New Media Art Exhibition

The exhibition combines analog and digital technologies to present the masterpieces of Giuseppe Castiglione (1688–1766), an Italian Jesuit missionary who became a highly influential painter in the court of the Kangxi, Yongzheng, and Qianlong Emperors.

This exhibition results from a unique collaboration between City University of Hong Kong and the National Palace Museum in Taipei. The exhibition integrates historical artworks, new media, and contemporary interactive art to create a compelling multisensory visitor experience. Full-size facsimiles of Castiglione's paintings, famous for combining Eastern and Western styles, are presented side by side with creative, digital interpretations of these works. The result is a fascinating meeting of traditional and contemporary modes of representation.

The presence of Jesuits such as Castiglione, both in Peking and in other major Chinese cities, led to new artistic practices and in a sharing of Eastern and Western philosophical, scientific, and artistic knowledge. In the "Castiglione in Context" section, the exhibition makes visible, through works of art and publications, the three-century-long intellectual and artistic exchanges.







Eternally Revolving Twin Rocks: Qi Baishi and Shi Lu

Qi Baishi and Shi Lu are masters of Chinese painting in the 20th century. While continuing the traditions of Chinese painting, they searched for new directions of Chinese art and produced works of art that evoke amazement to this day. The exhibition features over 40 items of works by Qi and Shi, selected from two Hong Kong private collections, Debonair Villa and Yitao Collection. Drawing a comparison between the two masters, this exhibition explores their artistic development and the processes in which they innovated the traditional Chinese art.

Orchestrations | Samson Young

Para Site presents *Orchestrations* - a solo exhibition by Samson Young that looks at the modalities of "orchestra-making" in various communities of Hong Kong. The exhibition consists of a selection of existing works and new commissions. It is the culmination of a year-long musicological research on the history of orchestras by Young in conversation with curator Qinyi Lim of Para Site and musicologist Giorgio Biancorosso.

The exhibition draws from Young's training as a composer, his understanding of the politics behind the Western musical notation system, and his view of orchestras as formed collectives. Through music making, orchestras are invested in both the formal act of performing music and the informal act of creating harmony. Interested in the slippages that can occur in the use of "orchestra" as a word, Young's presentation questions the structures that govern the way we experience music and the audiences they construct. In addition, the accompanying publication elaborates on the possible methodologies that can be used to build these temporary communities.

Orchestrations is part of Draft, a yearlong project anchored in nine interdisciplinary collaboratives—Beijing, Cairo, Cape Town, Hamburg, Hong Kong, Mexico City, Mumbai, St. Petersburg and Zurich—which collectively consider how contemporary art can produce, provoke and contribute to critical public debates. Draft is an initiative of Khanabadosh, Mumbai and Institute for Contemporary Art Research (IFCAR), Zurich University of the Arts (7HdK).



No References: A Revisit of Hong Kong Video and Media Art from 1985

The development of the contemporary art scene in Hong Kong is inextricably linked to the development of media art. Using the institutional history of Videotage as an alternative guiding chronology, this exhibition attempts to look back, reflect and re-evaluate Hong Kong's media art from a critical historical perspective.

Presenting works by pioneering video artists who have attempted to inspire each other in their collective goal of developing media art in Hong Kong forms the point of departure for the exhibition. The works display both interpersonal inspiration and independent creativity that manifest themselves in a transgressive historical consciousness – one that transcends the limits of media as well as personal and social boundaries. Adopting an investigative archival approach, this exhibition also discusses about the event of documenting media works as a "re-mediatizing" process.

Committed is a solo exhibition of the French artist Vincent Cazeneuve/Wensen Qi presented by Sin Sin Fine Art and Le French May. His last researches about bodiless lacquer reconnected him with this ancient technique and enabled the artist to explore applying lacquer on wood, fibers, or fabrics. His creations connect the audience to the primitive sensation of the natural beauty.

Born in Toulouse in 1977, Cazeneuve moved to Chongqing, Toulouse's sister city, in 2007 where he opened his own studio. Cazeneuve has also been exhibiting in and touring China, France, Japan and Thailand as a performance and installation artist. His encountered lacquer during his first trip to China in which he had an apprenticeship in the studio of a Chongqing master.

Lacquer painting requires patience and fortitude as the processes of embedding, scattering, rubbing and layering require numerous repetitions. His creation stems from the idea that the artist's poetic sensations are embodied in the manual repetitions.





The Arts of Deng Erya and Huang Bore

This exhibition—co-organised by the Hong Kong Museum of Art, Art Museum of The Chinese University of Hong Kong, Xiang Gang Museum and Dongguan Museum—features paintings and calligraphies drawn from several collections in Hong Kong and Guangdong by two masters, Deng Erya and Huang Bore.

Deng Erya (1884 – 1954) was born in Peking in the late Qing Dynasty and was active at the time of the founding of the Republican China. Deng was a well-known scholar, calligrapher, seal engraver, painter and poet in Southern China, who promoted seal engraving in the region.

Huang Bore (1901 – 1968) was born in Dongguan, and settled in Hong Kong. He promoted traditional ink painting and emphasised the abstract quality of brushwork by taking up the style of Hua Yan for his flower-and-bird paintings, Shitao for his landscapes, and Chen Hongshou for his figure paintings. In 1923, Huang founded the Guihai Art Cooperative, which later developed into the National Painting Research Society.







The restoration of Béthanie, built by the Mission Étrangères de Paris in 1875, was completed in November 2006 and it is reborn as the new home of School of Film and Television, Hong Kong Academy for Performing Arts.

The basement wine cellar was converted into a museum recording the history of Béthanie and of the French Mission's activities throughout Asia during the past three centuries, under the patronage of BNP Paribas.

The rare manuscripts that the library holds includes shanben printed in the Ming and Qing Dynasty that have been listed in the First and Second batch of "Guo Jia Zhen Gui Gu Ji Ming Lu", an official directory from the Chinese government on old manuscripts that have been designated as having significant cultural value.

CCSC regularly hosts events and lectures open to the public and its members, on a wide range of topics pertaining to Chinese culture, as well as engaging in long-term cultural projects for research purposes.

Opened in March 2014, Liang Yi Museum is Hong Kong's largest private museum as well as the home to one of the world's largest and best-curated collections of Chinese antique furniture, made of the treasured materials huanghuali and zitan, from the Ming and Qing dynasties. University Museum and Art Gallery, The University of Hong Kong

The University Museum and Art Gallery (UMAG) of the University of Hong Kong was founded in 1953 as the Fung Ping Shan Museum. It is the oldest continuously-operated museum in Hong Kong and has over the past sixty years built up a diverse collection of ceramics and bronzes dating from the Neolithic period (c. 7000 – c. 2100 BC) to the Qing dynasty (1644 – 1911), as well as traditional and modern paintings from the Ming dynasty (1368 – 1644) to the 21st century.

Chief amongst the collections are the Museum's ceramics, which show the extraordinary achievements of Chinese potters from Neolithic period painted pottery jars, to the decorative porcelains of the Qing dynasty.

The Museum was originally established as a teaching museum and has maintained this commitment to the University to this day through the teaching of Chinese art and museum studies and by encouraging students and school pupils to broaden their education through the arts.






